2024 SUMMARY

This year was a banner year for the CSU team as our members contributed 51,874 hours for the year and participated in 20,236 calls for service in 2024. We continue to be a force multiplier for LCSO as we expand our department and the roles and responsibilities of our team members. We began supporting department-wide Well-being checks (17W) and nine of our volunteers are now actively engaged in the STEP program, which allows them to support deputies more effectively at the scene of non-injury traffic crashes.

Our Marine team grew to 20 members utilizing our four boats to provide more time on the water in support of safety in the boating community of Lee County. We've formed our own

Administrative/Marketing team to help support the rapid growth and evolving needs of our members and we are increasing our School Support and Chaplain presences as well. As our team expands to over 200 members, so does our need for training. In 2025, we'll go through a complete revision and enhancement of our training methods, documentation, and processes. We're also looking to enhance the support we provide to LCSO. We're asking Captains, bureau, and department heads to evaluate their daily and long-term needs and reach out to us. Chances are we will have members with skill sets that meet those general or specialized needs.
